During the day teams are given three separate attempts to complete as many robot missions as they can in rounds lasting two and a half minutes. The nerves set in before the first round as spectators began to gather round, looking down from balconies above to gain a birds eye view of the action. Feeling quietly hopeful, we watched with eager anticipation as the organiser with her microphone boomed "Dunottar Deimos! Are - you - READY?.....5-4-3-2-1. LEGO!" and the bright red buzzer was pressed to start the match. Our team was off. We held our breath as the robot launchedand spectacularly crashed! This was swiftly followed by further crashes where the robot was not stopping where it should have. The team looked on in absolute disbelief. We had tested it thoroughly. Why was this happening?

We realised that the bright lights of the competition table were affecting the light sensors on the robot, therefore it was not stopping on a black line as was intended. The practice tables available were in a darker area of the hall and the robot had worked when tested there.

They felt crushed. A first round score of just 9 points was significantly short of the 60 or 70 points the team had hoped for, but the team rallied round and a decision was made to completely rewrite their code before the next round. The team had been working on this for months and it was no small task, but they set to work adapting all the code and retesting every mission. One of the highlights of the day was watching the tenacity and strength of character they showed in the face of pressure.

Meanwhile, back at the competition tables, our second team was full of excitement as the red buzzer was pressed to signal the start of their first round robot game. Their robot had an absolutely wonderful round, scoring 104 points with all but one of their planned missions working successfully. Incredibly, this score put Dunottar Dark Matter in the lead out of the 20 other teams competing!

As the day progressed the teams were whisked off to various judging sessions to be quizzed about their robot design, team working values and to present their project. The competition this year had a space theme and was entitled "Into Orbit"; for the project the teams had to focus on problems astronauts faced during long term space travel and come up with their own innovative solution. Both teams presented confidently, spoke clearly and with much enthusiasm during the judging and should be proud of the way they conducted themselves.

As the day drew to a close, Dunottar Dark Matter remained the highest scoring team in the robot game; we all applauded them proudly when they went on stage as winners of the "Robot Performance Award", taking home a large yellow trophy made of lego of course!

Macbeth Theatre Trip

Returning home from battle, the victorious Macbeth meets three witches on the heath. Driven by their disturbing prophecies, he sets out on the path to murder.

On Tuesday 8th January, forty-five pupils in years 10, 11 and 12 visited the Barbican Theatre to experience the Royal Shakespeare Company's contemporary production of Shakespeare's darkest psychological thriller. This show marked both Christopher Eccleston's RSC debut and the return of Niamh Cusack to the company.

In an interview with The Guardian's Gareth Mclean, Eccleston stated that he has finally achieved his ambition of playing Macbeth. Pupils sat captivated by his ultra-macho interpretation of Shakespeare's villain. Eccleston rolled and swaggered around the stage, presenting a character who was evidently confident in the world he had created. When he assumed the crown, he sprawled in a black leather chair (which served as a throne), presuming to know how to retain control and rule.

Pupils observed the play's fixation with time. This was emphasised by director Polly Findlay's centre stage placing of a red-faced digital clock, counting down from the butchery of King Duncan to Macbeth's own delightfully cathartic demise, resuming the monarchic natural order. Upon Malcolm's rightful reinstatement as heir to the throne the countdown begins again,

highlighting a sinister, cyclical thirst for power.

After the show, pupils noted that the three young girls playing the witches were 'pretty creepy': an oxymoron epitomising the unnerving juxtaposition of sweetness and the supernatural.

Year 7 Pupils Take Part in Young Voices Concert

Our pupils joined school choirs from across the country to perform at one of 24 concerts taking place across England. In total, over 150,000 children will have taken part in Young Voices' largest concert tour to date.

Young Voices, which stages the school concerts, aims to inspire a love of music and create memories for the children that will last a lifetime.

Enthusiastic pupils from schools from across the South-East sang as a single choir to an audience of friends and family at the 20,000-capacity O2 Arena.

The pupils were accompanied by Tony Hadley, the lead singer of the 1980s New Romantic band Spandau Ballet.



The concert raised funds for Teenage Cancer Trust, a charity that provides specialist nursing care and support to young people with cancer.

The building work on the new Sixth Form Centre continues to make excellent progress. Visitors to the site this week can catch a glimpse of the new facility as several of the hoarding boards have been removed, uncovering the previously hidden building.

The roof surfacing is now finished and all of the glazed curtain walling frames (which hold the glass panels) are in place. The exterior walls of the new building will be mostly glass but where there is brickwork, this has now been completed.

The new building will benefit from energy efficient underfloor heating instead of more traditional radiators, which has now been fully installed.

Over in the Pelican Block, which adjoins the new centre, refurbishment works have included new windows being fitted, the heating system has been upgraded with new radiators throughout and the internal walls have been made good and plastered.

Scholars & Careers

Use of Augmented Reality and Immersive Technologies in Design Industries

After attending a lecture organised by the IET at the university of Surrey, one of our Dunottar scholars was inspired to write the piece below on augmented reality.

The latest wave of technology which includes leaps forward in virtual reality and augmented reality is upon us and with it, huge industries like car companies have been able to harness this technology to their advantage. You most likely know of augmented reality as it has become a feature which many phones include. You probably even know of virtual reality -accessed through headsets which put us in virtual environments. Most people have seen the Oculus rift headsets, whether you see it through social media or online.

Virtual reality puts us in immersive and entirely computer generated simulations while augmented reality superimposes a computer generated image over the real world. One area where these technologies are being harnessed aside from entertainment and gaming industries is design industries. One example is McLaren, the car company. This company is famous for its Super Cars that are both luxurious and intricate. Before technologies like this were available the company had to design cars by drawing them which meant they were only 2d and unrealistic so often time and money could be wasted transferring a 2d design into a 3D clay model (which are frequently used in this industry) and the result would be very different from the original design.



However with these new technologies McLaren is able to design cars in virtual environments with specialised Software so can reduce the time it takes to create the car. Using augmented realities the company can transfer the car into the real world so they can even create advertisements for the car before any of them have even be produced!

These technologies put companies like McLaren ahead of all other competitors because it saves huge sums of money and valuable time. This technology is likely to revolutionise design in many other industries and could have huge practical applications across other sectors such as education and healthcare.

All these innovations in virtual technology have come from gaming platforms and the bulk of which are located in Guildford as one of the biggest game design hubs in England, so all of these technological advancements are happening on our doorstep.
