One landed, blowing out the windows (well wire-netted) above my desk—by that stage we were under the desks. It was the R.E. exam and we did it by fits and starts, as the V.I.s passed, and were given extra time."
- 5. Mrs Elliot-Pyle nearly closed the school but whilst she was considering this action, a new pupil who had crossed the common during a bombing raid arrived. She decided that the child had gone through so much that she would keep the school open, despite the difficulties.



## Dunottar Book Club May Book Pick




