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### Dunottar Hailed "a Secret Surrey Star" By Tatler

We are delighted to announce that Dunottar has been given a glowing review in the Tatler School Guide 2021, describing the school as "a secret Surrey star" and praising the pastoral care.

Each year, Tatler's team of researchers gathers information on the UK's finest independent schools, to produce a shortlist which will feature in their prestigious guide. Schools are not just chosen for their academic results or their outstanding facilities (although these are closely looked at). To feature in the Tatler Schools Guide schools must offer the whole package — holistic pastoral care, a focus on character education as much as pure academics, and the ability to accommodate and nurture all their pupils, resulting in well educated, but most importantly, happy children.

This is the first time that the school has featured in the guide since becoming co-educational in 2015.

"Parents rave about the warm and nurturing atmosphere at Dunottar, which is something of a secret Surrey star, set in a Palladian-style mansion in 15 beautiful acres just outside Reigate town centre. According to one mother, the pastoral care at this coed (it was all-girls until 2014) is 'second to none', with a very strong community ethos and great value placed on knowing every child as an individual and developing their character. 'The personal attention you get as a parent is outstanding too,' adds another mother. After lunch, Ian, along with Simon Hughes, Editor of the Cricketer, hosted a skills masterclass for pupils, followed by a lively Q&A session.




# Year 7 Poetry Writing

# Spotlight on Mrs Thorne, Head of Geography

There is no doubt that the past year has brought to the fore how dedicated and passionate our teachers are about their profession. Switching between remote learning and being back in the classroom, getting to grips with new technology and different ways of teaching and interacting with pupils has been an enormous challenge, but one that the staff here at Dunottar have responded to with creativity, energy and enthusiasm.

For many of our teachers, their passion for teaching goes beyond the walls of Dunottar, sharing their expertise and knowledge with the wider teaching community. Mrs Thorne, Head of Geography here at Dunottar, gives us an insight into what else she has been up to recently.

"Developing teaching expertise has always been a priority for the Geography Department and I have been fortunate to have been working with Tutor2u on a range of commissioned projects over the last couple of years. This has given me access to a wide range of resources and ideas on delivering content, particularly focusing on exam technique.

This term, I have been co-presenting and also writing a number of 'Revision Blasts' for GCSE and A level geography which use some really innovative Retrieval Practice ideas to strengthen knowledge and identify gaps in learning. These sessions are delivered to a live online audience who can participate in the chat through YouTube. The sessions are recorded and posted on YouTube, along with the slides which are circulated to schools across the UK.



Many of these ideas are making their way into our lesson planning and schemes of work, to offer our pupils some really engaging and interactive retrieval activities. Pupils are also using the pre-recorded sessions to support the development of exam technique scaffolding and to extend our young learners at GCSE level."

And then this term - repeat all that again!



You absolutely ROCK.








# Easter Activities to Support Wellbeing
