




The Dunottar Choral Society is Recruiting!


Speak Out Challenge

Pupils have been fascinated by the lack of racism in Tudor society and have asked probing questions such as 'so, when and why did racism develop?' which they will begin to understand a little more in their Year 9 history lessons.



The Winner of the Great Dunottar Bake Off is....




Congratulations to Caspar for his incredible baking! Mrs French was very impressed with your beautiful presentation and creative ideas.



Dunottar Football Cup Success

For the first time ever we've seen two of our football teams progress to the last 16 of the English Schools' National Cup. Our Year 9s were the first team to progress through to the 4th round after a convincing 4-1 against Lancing College. Our Year 8 boys matched this feat beating Archbishop Tenison's CofE High School 4-2. Both sides have been drawn against Lingfield College in the last 16 with the Year 9 boys unfortunately losing their closely contested tie 4-2 on Monday 13th December. It was a great experience for the boys who got to play this game at Dorking Wanderers Stadium, Meadowbank Football Ground and they had their peers there supporting them. The Year 8s are away to Lingfield with this tie being played in January and we hope that they can make history by becoming the first Dunottar football team to make the guarter finals of the cup.



It's been great to return to a full season of competitive rugby following a year's absence from the sport. There have been some great games throughout the season across all age groups. Irrespective of the results, in individual games, or throughout the season, each team has come on considerably, representing the school exceptionally well, and displaying the Warrior Learner characteristics in abundance on the rugby field.

The U12A were unbeaten all season, but came up against a very strong and well organized Epsom College outfit in their final game. There is great hope for this team moving forward, and competition for a place in the A squad is evident, with wonderful strength in depth and boys knocking on the door from the squads below.


The U13s have been a pleasure to coach all season, and combinations of injuries/unavoidable unavailability to some of the more influential players impacted us throughout the season. However, the progress shown from the start of the season to the end was clear and evident. Tackling and rucking principally came on in leaps and bounds. The respective squads' attitudes and work rate cannot be faulted.

The U14A and B team have also had good campaigns. The U14A team put in some huge performances throughout the season, often against far stronger and bigger (in stature) opponents. The

way the boys conducted themselves in adversity at times throughout the season, is also worth noting - a credit to the school. The U14Bs have trained and played with enjoyment throughout the term, and we look forward to seeing this continue as they move into the U15 ranks next term.

The U15s have had a stellar season. Mr Lowe has invested huge time and effort into their tactical and technical understanding of their game as individuals and as a team, and the squad have been motivated and engaged throughout. The season finished on Saturday as a B team take on Claremont Fan Court once again. However, for the A team, the season has culminated in two strong wins against Ewell Castle and RAA, where team defence was the crucial factor, as both games were won without a point being conceded. We look forward to seeing how this group of boys develop as we move to sevens and ultimately U16 rugby next year.







Sport

The U16 and U18 XV squads have had a number of fixtures this year, displaying exceptional camaraderie throughout the season. Again, injuries have plagued the team at different stages. But it was a reflective final game vs Whitgift on 8th December, as the Year 13s played their final 15-a-side game for the school. Three of the boys would have played in the first Year 7 rugby match for the cohort many moons ago, vs Caterham at Reigate Rugby Club in 2015. What a journey these boys have been on, having been the original first co-ed 11+ entry, in many ways trailblazing the way for the success that has followed. As well as how they've developed as rugby players, with many now playing club rugby, and in the case of Ollie, Surrey County selection once again this year, what is most pleasing to see is how these once young and fresh faced 11 year olds are now fantastic and mature young adults.

We now move to the 7s season alongside football, with some form of tournament entries for all age groups, and the U14s and U16s will represent the school at the National School Sevens at Rosslyn Park too.

Netball

This term, Aces High Performance Netball Club have started their Surrey Squad using Dunottar as their training base. Many of our Dunottar pupils have earned a place in the squad and are benefitting from the high quality coaching delivered by Rowena Fairclough. Our partnership with London Pulse Netball also continues with representation in the Pulse Hubs for some of our high flyers. Many of our pupils are now representing top quality clubs and are competing in the Surrey Junior Netball League or South Regional League, in addition to their Saturday Dunottar fixtures. Lacrosse

Now we are halfway through the lacrosse season our teams are all in great positions as we build up to the season finale of the National Schools taking place from 19th to 22nd March.

In order to help all the girls progress even faster, we are starting sessions before school on Mondays and Wednesdays that will be open to all years every week. These sessions will be focussed on individuals' needs whether it be passing, catching, cradling, dodging, defending, goalkeeping or shooting. We can't emphasise enough how important it is for the girls to regularly pick

up their lacrosse sticks and practise. To help with this, there will be rebounders permanently available so that the girls can practise in any break or lunch time regardless of whether the sports hall is available. Regular videos on Sparkjar will be playing a bigger role in developing the tactical side of the girls' lacrosse and will hopefully help

parents to understand the game better as well.



As with other sports, one major area that we are encouraging as a department is for the girls to attend clubs outside of school. Reigate Lacrosse Club, formerly known as Dragonflies, is the main chance the girls will get to train and play more regularly in the SEWLA (South East Women's Lacrosse Association) Junior Leagues. Both year 7 and 8 pupils are eligible for the U13 team, but currently, there are only year 7s attending. It would be great to see this continue to grow with the year 8s that have expressed interest also getting involved. The Year 9s and 10s have started training under floodlights on Wednesday evenings from 5:30-7:00pm at Reigate Rugby Club. We're hoping that a few more girls joining

their ranks will allow us to arrange friendlies to re-establish the U15 team that fell by the wayside as a result of Covid. Our Senior team players have been training and playing with the Reigate Senior team, improving greatly and winning some close games this season.

We have also had students representing the school at Regional Talent Pathway and competing in the U15 and U18 SEWLA Super Counties tournament. These are fantastic opportunities for the girls involved and we wish them all the luck as they progress.



Cross Country

Careers Update

During this autumn term, the careers department have arranged multiple talks in order to get pupils thinking about the future.

The term kicked off with some ex-pupils talking to our current Sixth Formers about their university and apprenticeship experience, describing the benefits of both routes and giving some useful survival tips for university.

Psychology is now one of the most popular courses to study at university and in September we had a fascinating talk from Clinical Psychologist Laura Baxter, giving details of both the job and the routes into the career. Crypto currencies were the subject of the next talk from Dom Longman. Although a highly technical and niche industry, the message was clear that these industries employ a very wide range of skills and very much look for the

rounded student, with a wealth of "softer skills". An emotional talk was led by expoliceman Spence Ogilvie in which he read a poem on the harsh realities of being in the police force. This talk highlighted the passion often required to follow a career caring and protecting people. The final talk this term was delivered via a performance by Enact Solutions to Year 9 on the multitude of careers in the NHS. This was a highly energetic, entertaining, and informative performance highlighting the enormous number of different roles within the fifth largest employer in the world.


